#### **Positive Trends**

On average, the plan review time frame targets were met for all project types issued during January through March of 2013. PDS plan review had a plans examiner retire at the end of December leaving the plan review team short one member. Time frame targets were maintained due to dropping permit submittals in the first part of January due to declining submittals during the holidays, inclement weather and overtime put in by PDS team members. Hiring a new employee to replace the retired employee has helped PDS improve processing times in March. Level 1 single family permit first review times improved from 8 days in February to 7 days in March. Level 2 single family permit first review times improved from 12 days last month to 11 days currently. New commercial permit first review times improvement permit first review times improved from 20 days last month to 18 days. Level 1 tenant improvement permit first review times improved from 3 days last month to 2 days currently.

## **Areas of Concern**

As of April 1<sup>st</sup>, there were 56 new single family dwellings under PDS review, an increase from 48 applications on March 1<sup>st</sup>. PDS expects these application numbers to hold or increase during the spring and summer months which could put pressure on timeframes.

The number of major tenant improvement projects submitted to the department is expected to increase as the 8<sup>th</sup> & Main high-rise project moves forward. This could impact the review timeframes of major tenant

improvement projects because many of the 8<sup>th</sup> & Main tenant improvement projects are being submitted at the same time. Level 3 tenant improvement permit first review times increased from 14 days last month to 15 days currently. PDS is assigning entire floors of the 8<sup>th</sup> and Main project to different reviewers to alleviate any bottlenecks that might be caused by simultaneous submission of plans.

Plan review timeframes for new commercial buildings are expected to lengthen with the submittal of several very large and complicated projects (JUMP, The Terraces at Harris Ranch, 916 Park Apartments) and others that are currently under review. Level 1 and Level 2 tenant improvements are being processed within targets, however it is taking slightly longer to process them this year than last year. To address these issues, PDS is hiring an additional plans examiner to help maintain timeframe targets for all project types.

## **Other Trends**

No multifamily permits were issued during this reporting period, but several multi-family permit applications were submitted to PDS in February and March. The average time a permit waits for a customer to pick it up (customer pick-up time) after PDS has completed its review remained about the same overall when compared to last month with the exception of new commercial. The average customer pick-up time for new commercial building permits went down from 22 days to 10 days. As the weather has improved, more commercial customers appear to be paying for and picking up their permits more quickly.
